### This is **DeMolay**

#### Brother Stevie Boom Blue Mountain Lodge

When I joined lodge, I was quite honestly baffled and disappointed at how little my new brethren knew about DeMolay. When it became known that I was a senior DeMolay, I fielded questions like "Do the DeMolay have a ritual?", "Are there DeMolay in BC?", and even, "What IS DeMolay?"... I was floored. Especially given that DeMolay in Canada traces much of its history to British Columbia and the involvement of the Masonic community in its birth, development and growth. A number of our current and past Grand Lodge officers trace their first involvements in Masonry to their DeMolay experience.

In DeMolay, we are taught about the Masonic Family. Some have suggested the notion that DeMolays are kind of like 'junior masons', or 'masons in training', and that when you reach the age of majority (which is 21) the next natural step is Lodge. So when I was welcomed into lodge, I was confused to say the least as to how some of my brethren knew so little about a 'Family member'. I realized that something had gone astray somewhere along the way. But more importantly I realized a role that I could serve amongst my new brothers and an opportunity to teach them about the organization that has led me here.

So this is DeMolay 101.

Jacques DeMolay was the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar. During the twilight years of the Crusades, he and his brethren were rounded up, captured, striped of their fortune, tortured into false confessions, and burned at the stake in 1314 by King Phillip IV of France. Jacques DeMolay was relentlessly beaten, tortured and placed on the rack but no amount of punishment could make him give up the names of his fellow Templars.

Fast forward a few years, in 1919, a mason of Ivanhoe Lodge #446 in Kansas City, named Frank S. Land met a young man named Louis Lower whom he had been asked to find employment for. Like many sixteen year olds at the time, Lower had just lost his father in WWI. As the director of the Masonic Relief and Employment Bureau of the Scottish Rite, Dad Land thought "how lonely it must be for a boy not to have a man to talk with, or a man to provide some type of inspiration and direction." Dad Land decided there was a need for an organization where boys would have the opportunity to associate with other boys, a place they could share common interests, learn responsibility and other skills that would benefit them throughout their lives. Masons taking interest in the young people, being a friend to them, advising them, and perhaps even providing them with employment opportunities.

Dad Land asked Louis to invite some friends to a meeting who would become the original group of nine DeMolays. At the second meeting, there were a total of 31 young men present. By the fall of 1920, Mother Chapter as it became known had an outstanding baseball team, a DeMolay marching unit, and even a 100-piece band. Today there are active DeMolay chapters throughout the US and Canada, Italy, Germany, Romania, Peru, the Philippines, Australia, Aruba, Bolivia, Serbia, Japan, and Brazil.

The Order of DeMolay is not that different from the organization that all of you love. Books could be written about the similarities and parallels but we are just going to touch on a few. DeMolays are a group of young men who try to live clean, manly, upright and patriotic lives. We do this while learning how to run an organization, mature as leaders among our peers, make life long friendships and have a blast along the way. They have a ritual just like us, they take obligations just like us, and they're striving to become better men just-like-us.

There are two degrees, Initiatory and DeMolay degree. In the initiatory degree, the candidate is conducted around the room and instructed in the symbolisms, grips, passwords and secrets of that degree. They take upon themselves a similar obligation to live by the virtues that DeMolay teaches which is then recited back from memory. The second degree consists of the candidate observing a play that is put on by the members, depicting the capture, trails and death of Jacque DeMolay, followed by a second obligation.

Like a Masonic Lodge's candles around a volume of sacred law, DeMolay places seven representing seven cardinal virtues: Filial love (love for the parents), Reverence for sacred things, courtesy, comradeship, fidelity, cleanness (thought, word and deed), and patriotism. On the altar, DeMolay also places school books, as a symbol of intellectual liberty as the foundation for our country's greatness.

Like a lodge, DeMolay has the three principle officers, Master, Senior and Junior councilors. The Master sits in the east as a symbol of the morning of life and rising sun. Junior councilor sits in the south as the noon of life where half of your years lie before and half behind. The senior is seated in the west as the eve of life and setting sun. They also have a chaplain, marshal, stewards, deacons, orator, scribe, treasurer, seven preceptors, almoner, sentinel, standard bearer, and some chapters are even lucky enough to have an organist.

Among the other officers, each chapter also has an office at the left hand of the master councilor of particular relevance to you, Chapter Advisor. Chapter Advisor has historically been held by a Mason but in more recent years has been adapted to be held by any member of the chapter's advisory council. Chapter Advisor serves as the representative to the chapter's advisory council at meetings and functions. But a Chapter Advisor is so much more than a chaperone to the young men. They are a mentor, a leader, a good person, both a role model and a friend. Some of the greatest mentors in my life have been and continue to be Masons who were involved in our DeMolay chapter. As a member of lodge, you have the unique opportunity to play a pivotal role in the life of a young man who could one day sit beside you as your brother in lodge. You could be helping to mold the minds of the future of Lodge from as early as 12 years old. When you stop and think about it for second, that is a very powerful thing in so many different lights. It becomes clear that one of the best, easiest and most fruitful ways to ensure the future of this Masonic organization is to invest in DeMolay.

So why not share the craft that you all love so much with a grandson, nephew or even the little annoying neighbor kid next door. Why not start a proud Masonic heritage in your family? If for some reason you are unable to think of someone eligible, why don't you yourself become involved through the parents club or advisory council. Become a chaperone and go hang out on ski trips, sporting events and travel to other DeMolay conventions. Or quite simply attend a DeMolay meeting and learn more and show our Masonic support.

If I have but sparked the slightest interest or curiosity about DeMolay in you here, then I urge you get out to a DeMolay function and learn more about our Masonic youth and our future.


